Abstract Body

This report uses the analogy of a river to describe the continuum of prevention, from upstream interventions that create the conditions for health and wellness (e.g., health public policy), through downstream care services that prevent severe outcomes, including hospitalization and death (e.g., substitute prescribing). At all levels of prevention, a harm reduction approach uses compassion and understanding to keep people as safe as possible, while respecting human rights and dignity.
